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Pastor's Message



A Message From Pastor Jira Albers

"By your endurance you will gain your lives."

Luke 21:19

Grit: A Faith Perspective

When evaluating the state of the church and the world, several recent discussions with church leaders has focused on the lack of "grit" in today's people. What is grit? Psychologist Angela Lee Duckworth (who has made grit the focus of her study for years) defines grit as "the ability to persevere in pursuing a future goal over a long period of time and not giving up... It is having stamina. It's sticking with your future, day-in, day-out, not just for the week, not just for the month, but for years and working really hard to make that future a reality. Grit is living life like it's a marathon, not a sprint."

The idea of grit is nothing new. Our grandparents encouraged this same perseverance in the face of struggle. Somehow, grit has faded from some in our culture and many are easily devastated by the challenges of life. Some turn to drugs, some succumb to the pressures of culture, and others find some other form of release from the hard knocks in life. They lack the ability to endure through great struggle.

The debilitating inability to endure, however, is not something new to our culture. The writer of Revelation was encouraging grit in all seven of his congregations as they faced persecutions from both Rome and the local synagogues who were increasingly not

allowing Christians to participate in Sabbath worship. Some of the congregations were giving up on faith in one way shape or form because of the persecutions. Others were holding fast. But, to all John preached a word of hope that God will bring them to the other side of these persecutions. He gave a word of hope so that they might endure in faith; so that they might have grit.

Christian grit is a little different though than the "pull yourself up by the bootstraps" kind of grit that your grandparents encouraged. Rather than trusting in oneself to make it through, Christians find their grit by trusting in God's promises. Noah built a ship based on God's promises. Abraham and Sarah waited for a child for years based on God's promises. Moses led the Israelites in the wilderness for years based on the promise of a land to call their own. Paul trusted in God's provision while imprisoned multiple times. And, Jesus prayed, "not what I will, but what you will" (Mark 14:36) when facing his death while praying in the garden.

Christian "grit" is a faith that rests on the promises of God and therefore is full of hope (Romans 15:13). Jesus does not promise a life free from struggle, but Jesus does promise new life after the struggle. That is the basis of grit.

The Question Box

(Questions About Our Christian Life)

Was Jesus a Jew or a Christian?"

Jesus was a Jew. He was raised in a synagogue and taught in the temple. He became a Rabbi and continued to teach in the Synagogues. Christians are followers of Christ. It would be weird to say that Jesus is Christian. Does he follow himself? Christianity is actually an expression of Judaism with a focus on Christ. – Pastor Jira

A Closer Look at the Bible - Pastor Jira Albers

"And to the angel of the church in Philadelphia write: These are the words of the holy one, the true one, who has the key of David, who opens and no one will shut, who shuts and no one opens: "I know your works. Look, I have set before you an open door, which no one is able to shut. I know that you have but little power, and yet you have kept my word and have not denied my name. I will make those of the synagogue of Satan who say that they are Jews and are not, but are lying—I will make them come and bow down before your feet, and they will learn that I have loved you. Because you have kept my word of patient endurance, I will keep you from the hour of trial that is coming on the whole world to test the inhabitants of the earth. I am coming soon; hold fast to what you have, so that no one may seize your crown. If you conquer, I will make you a pillar in the temple of my God; you will never go out of it. I will write on you the name of my God, and the name of the city of my God, the new Jerusalem that comes down from my God out of heaven, and my own new name. Let anyone who has an ear listen to what the Spirit is saying to the churches." (NRSV, Revelation 3:7-13)

In my article for this month the notion of "grit" was explored. Since grit is a persistent endurance toward a future goal without giving up, it seems pertinent to study a section of Revelation that encourages the people of God to take on such endurance.

What we will be looking at is the brief letter in Revelation for the church in Philadelphia. But, before we get into that, let us take a look at the book of Revelation in general to get an idea of what is going on. Revelation is written in the literary genre of apocalypse. An apocalypse is a type of literature that we do not currently have in our culture, therefore it is hard to read and understand. The closest we have to apocalypse is science fiction: a story set in the technological future (usually including aliens) that still sends a relevant message to the people reading. Apocalypse, similarly, is a story that sends a relevant message to the people reading, but is set in a horizontally divided world where what occurs on earth also occurs in heaven at the same time. In an apocalypse, if a war is occurring on earth, there is also a war occurring in the heavens. What if someone could be ripped from the earth and placed temporarily in the heavens? Then in heaven they would be able to see divine truths and understand "why" the chaotic and confusing events on the earth are occurring.

Revelation is written by a pastor (John of Patmos), who has been exiled to the island of Patmos by the Romans. Though he is in forced exile (an island prison), he still wants to pastor his congregations (of which there are seven). Therefore, he sends a letter to the congregations, but it is written in this strange literary form of strange images, bazaar animals, and wild symbolism because he does not want the Roman guards to understand the damning things that he is saying about Rome and Roman culture.

So, what is John preaching to his seven churches? Well, John wants his churches to "endure" the horrors of Rome (remember, in the recent past family members have been fed to lions under Nero) and to endure their current persecutions from both Rome and the synagogues who have started to kick Christians out of worship. He writes a book of hope for his persecuted people promising that justice will take place. In other words, he wants his churches to endure...he wants them to have some grit.

When persecuted religiously, you have a few options: you could join the enemy so that the enemy no longer persecutes; you could be religious in secret and pretend to be like the enemy throughout the week; or you could endure the pain and persecution while holding steadfast to the faith. The seven churches have gone down different paths in response to the pressures and persecutions of Rome, but Philadelphia is one of the few churches that chose the path of endurance.

The members of the church in Philadelphia are poor. They have no one of social power among their ranks. Their synagogue has kicked them out (imagine the pastor of your church just up a deciding that you can no longer attend or even enter your family church). And, on top of it all, Rome is acting as Rome, ruling through power and persecution. The temptation is to give up on the faith in some way, but John encourages Philadelphia's endurance. He appreciates their "grit." John sets a vision of hope for this hurt church that sees beyond the persecutions (a "grit" related goal so to speak): "I will make you a pillar in the temple of my God; you will never go out of it. I will write on you the name of my God, and the name of the city of my God." With this encouragement, Philadelphia endures. They have grit.

Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, ELCA

Visitors from Saxony, Germany



The Northeastern PA Synod is blessed with four Companion Synods—a special relationship with the Lutheran Christians in five countries. These are Argentina and Uruguay; Slovenia; Tanzania; and Saxony, Germany. From October 4 to 15, we had the privilege of hosting 15 of our brothers and sisters from Saxony, Germany. The visitors ranged in age from 17 to "older"

While our visitors were in our Synod, they were each hosted by two different families—one in the Mountain Top area of the Synod and one in the greater Reading area.

From the moment they arrived on the 4th, the visitors had a very full agenda. Some of the opportunities provided to our brothers and sisters from Saxony were:

- · worship with their host families,
- · a retreat with our Saxony Committee to develop a covenant,
- going to a high school (American) football game,
- · spending 2 days in New York City,
- a day in Philadelphia,
- · a trip to Amish country,
- and a pig roast.

Grace, Reading Back to School Giveaway



The lazy days of summer maybe the norm for some people, but not for the congregation and supporters of Grace, Reading's Back to School Event. For the past four years Grace has hosted this event at their location on the southern side of Reading.

This community project started when four congregation volunteers agreed to assist on a project suggested by Rita Wilk at church council. Rita's dream was to hold an event open to all community members, where needed school supplies and backpacks could be given out to students. Donations were obtained from Grace members along with other churches within the West Berks Mission District. Reaching the targeted recipients was simplified by piggybacking on the resources established by our Growing with Grace Tutoring program. This tutoring program serves two elementary schools located within a few blocks of the church.

In its infancy, this one-day event reached about 120 students with new and used backpacks / bags filled with school supplies. A limited amount of new underwear was given out as well.

To make a greater impact, additional funds were needed to expand the number of backpacks and supplies offered. Over the last three years, grants have been written and granted from Thrivent, Walmart, and the NEPA Synod (your Mission Support dollars at work).
