Value 5: Giving Of Yourself



A Message From Pastor Jira Albers

"God loves a cheerful giver"

2 Cor. 9:7

Our last congregational value, "Giving of Yourself," was not created to get the church more money. In fact, "Giving of Yourself" is about more than money. Every part of our being is a gift from God, to be used by Jesus Christ in his mission of love.

We do not give of ourselves to be known as good people, nor do we give to win any sort of heavenly reward. On the cross, Jesus Christ already won us our reward, and, that was not of our own doing. Giving of ourselves is about loving God, and loving others. We love and give of ourselves because Jesus loved us and gave himself to us.

When I was a child, I wanted to do something really, really special for my parents, because I loved them and they loved me. So, I took the \$14 that I had saved and grabbed a set of new dishes (plates and bowls) which were marked \$13.99. It was a gift of love. Unfortunately, as anyone who is older than 11 knows, \$14.00 would not be enough for a \$13.99 item. When the total, including tax, came in well over \$14, my heart was crushed.

I think that the cashier saw that look of utter defeat on my face because she said, "You don't worry about a thing. I will take care of the rest." And, there we have it. A minimum wage earner helps a poor boy give a gift of love.
The cashier even helped me carry the heavy box of dishes out to the car where I hid it under my coat in the trunk.

I thought about that cashier the other day when the man in front of me at the grocery store had that familiar look of defeat on his face. He was trying to buy some eggs, milk, and bread. I was trying to buy some Reese's Peanut Butter cups. God reminded me of the love of that cashier. I looked at the cash in my hand, put back the candy, and paid for his food. You see, God used that cashier years before to plant Jesus' seed of giving into my heart.

Jesus' entire life was about giving. He gave his time in order to heal. He gave his power to provide food for a crowd. He gave his life on the cross in order to save us from sin and death. Jesus gave it all because he loves us.

Jesus gave of himself, and that seed of love and giving has sprouted again and again like a perennial that keeps sprouting and multiplying every spring. Planting seeds of love reaps a harvest of abundant love.

You have been blessed in abundance, so that you can share joyfully in abundance. As a follower of Jesus you strive to be "Giving of Yourself."

A Closer Look at the Bible - Pastor Jira Albers

It Is All About Returning To The Garden Of Eden

There is one image that is pervasive throughout most of scripture, and it is that of the garden of Eden. If you remember, on the seventh day of creation, God rested. And, while God rested, God made a garden on a mountain in Eden. God filled the garden with animals. To help tend the animals and the garden, God created a man and a woman. For some time, God walked with humans and humans with God in love and peace. The humans trusted God for everything, and in return God provided for all their needs. Soon the eternal peace of the garden would be disrupted. In the garden, there was only one rule: do not eat from the fruit of the "tree of the knowledge of good and evil," for if they did, the humans would die "on that very day." The crafty serpent tempted the humans into eating from the fruit of the tree and their eyes are opened and they soon realize that they are naked. On a leisurely stroll in God's garden, God realized something was very different, and very wrong. The humans had eaten the fruit. As a result, God shows grace on the humans and does not kill them, but God does ban them from the garden. As Genesis 3:24 reads, "[God] drove out the man; and at the east of the garden of Eden he placed the cherubim, and a sword flaming and turning to guard the way to the tree of life."

It is amazing to see just how much this story shapes the whole rest of scripture. As you read through scripture, you will see some themes that very much have everything to do with a desire to return to the garden. God desires more than anything to have that close relationship of walking with us in the garden, but our "humanness" makes that very difficult. The Bible is filled page after page with stories about how humans fail to live the garden life of peace and trust in God. Humans start to murder one another. Humans start to ruin their own relationships with each other and with God, and begin to trust in other Gods. Humans continually prove that they cannot live in the presence of the divine. This refusal to trust God culminates in a great flood that God sends upon the earth to cleanse and purify the earth once again. And the rest of scripture is the story of how God tries over and over again to establish righteousness in the world. "Righteousness" means "right relationship," and that right relationship of the garden where humans lived in peace and trusted God is what God still desires.

As God tries to reestablish this relationship, you see that the stories of the Bible start to take a certain form. The form is the progression of the story of Eden, only in reverse. When humans were removed from the garden, the basic shape is moving away from the tree of life, through the gate down the mountain of the garden of Eden, past the cherubim with the flaming sword, and through the waters of the flood. So, in order to bring us back, you will see this progression in reverse: coming through the purifying waters, through the fire and cherubim, and moving up the mountain to the tree of life. For example, when God tries to restore the relationship with God's people by giving them the law (the ways to live in order to walk with God) you see that the people pass through the waters of the Red Sea, at base of the mountain Moses enters through the fire, goes up the mountain and meets God who gives him the law which is meant to create life among the people. It is a return to Eden.

When God gave the gift of the tabernacle, a space where God could be present with the people, a little miniature garden of Eden that traveled with the people, the design had the return to the garden explicitly in mind. If you took time to explore the tedious laws concerning the construction of the tabernacle, you would discover that people would purify themselves before entering (the flood), and when they looked forward toward the Holy of Holies (where God resided) they would see the fires of the sacrifices (flaming sword), cherubim sewn into the curtains of the Holy of Holies, and inside the curtains was the mercy seat (the arc) with cherubim on the lid, in which the laws of God were held and upon which God would sit. It is in this space where Moses would consult with God, and it was a garden of Eden in the wilderness.

You see the same things going on when the people enter the promised land. They go through the waters of the Jordon, in order to enter into their new Eden-ish life in the land God promised. As you see, this theme of returning to life in the garden continues throughout all of scripture. Think about the curtain tearing in two when Jesus dies on the cross. Think about the images at the end of Revelation, with a return to the tree of life. Once you understand the vital image of the garden, your understanding of the scriptures opens wide.

It was brought up at the Annual Meeting that the Yearly Treasurer's Report seemed to have some mistakes. Ash Wednesday Service will be at 12:15p.m. on Wednesday February 22nd. Pastor will also be available at the church from 4:00-6:00 p.m. for the disposition of ashes. Lenten Services will be virtual at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesdays during Lent.

The internet continues to be a major problem. Deb will be checking with Comcast about service and checking if there are any other companies that would be available for internet service to the church. She will let the Council know so we can make a decision on the best option.

FriEDENS: An Amazing Garden Story

A few weeks after the lockdown in the spring of 2020, I called a neighbor in town who had a garden in her front yard. It's Shartlesville, and the PA Dutch are used to their yards looking *just so,* so I knew this was a brave woman who loved gardening vegetables more than public opinion. I also knew she didn't have room for pumpkins in her small yard, so I called and proposed we plant some viney crops up on our church property. She agreed and even had the seeds, gardening skills, and ideas, so after consultation with council, the garden was born. We sent our crop to the neighboring UCC congregation's food pantry, and with the excess had physically- distant free produce giveaways.

In 2021, we expanded the garden by half, to about 50 by 75 feet. We watered each plant via a recycled gallon milk jug with a pinprick in the bottom. The plants were happy, but our backs were not. It took 45 minutes to an hour to water all the jugs, which we did nearly every day because the garden is in full sun. The black plastic we used for weed suppression became a slip-and-slide while we irrigated.

In 2022, we were able to install a drip irrigation system that did not require filling milk jugs and weed suppression fabric that was not slippery. The fabric required using a blow torch to make holes for planting but will be able to be used for multiple years. The irrigation only required turning on the spigot and letting it run for several hours, which was a true God-send because we had some unexpected health issues on the garden team that limited our volunteer force! It was an extraordinarily dry summer, so the grant came just in time.

This past summer we had 21 people volunteer in the garden, took produce to 5 food pantries or senior centers, including Cafe Esperanza in Reading, and welcomed 29 people into the garden at a joint VBS. Not only are we feeding our neighbors with free, fresh, pesticide-free produce, but we are also getting to know our neighbors, developing new connections in the congregation among volunteers, teaching children about food insecurity and the joy of gardening, and passing on agricultural wisdom.
