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Pastor's Message





A Message From Pastor Jira Albers

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight."

Proverbs 3:5

Discerning God's Will

"What is God's will for my life?" "Which job prospect shall I pursue?" "Is this the decision that God wants me to make?"

There are all the types of questions that come up from time to time as we try to live out our lives of faith. These questions are all about discerning God's will. In other words, they are about trying to figure out what God would want us to do. But, discernment is not necessarily easy. What if two options seem equally valid? What if no options seem to be valid? What if I do not want to do what seems to be God's will? What if God's will now does not match what God has done in the past?

I cannot even begin to answer these questions in a two column newsletter article, but I can provide some basics at least about the discernment process.

The first thing that you should understand is that discernment is ultimately about following God's will rather than our own. "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done," we pray every day when we pray the Lord's prayer. Our desire should not to be to seek a certain goal in our discernment, but rather to seek doing God's will.

What I mean by that is that if the question before you is, "Which job prospect shall I pursue?" the answer might be "Either one." Perhaps, either one will offer the opportunity to follow God's will. In that case, you just take the best stab at deciding on one and then be the person God has called you to be no matter which job you choose. God ultimately might not care

which job you choose, as long as you are following Jesus. On the other hand, asking a question about God's will might lead you to choose against one of the jobs because the job may inherently go against Jesus' closely held value of caring for the lowly (for example).

Because we are concerned about God's will, searching scripture is essential to finding what may be God's will. Do you want to know what Jesus may think? Go to the source and tease it out.

This too might not be easy. When Peter searched the Hebrew Bible while considering inclusion of the gentiles into God's promises, he certainly saw the Deuteronomy 7 injunctions not to marry or associate with gentiles along with the many injunctions against eating what they eat (eating what is impure such as pork). But, he would have also seen Isaiah 49:6 which says that Israel is to be a "light for the gentiles," as well as the example of Ruth who is a gentile, but has the loving-kindness of God. With those contradictions, how shall he decide? Where will Peter look?

Peter discovers the revelations that God has given other people. Cornelius was also given guidance by God, and this confirms what Paul suspected God was up to. Gentile inclusion is God's will.

Discernment requires consulting scripture and also talking with other people of faith when seeking God's will. After that, we decide the best we can, trusting in God's ability to make all things new and good.

(Questions About Our Christian Life)

"Why go to church, can't I just be a Christian at home?"

It depends. If your idea of Christianity simply concerns doing right and wrong, then you can be a Christian at home. However, biblical Christians are those who abide in Jesus, and Jesus in them. Christians are those who have a relationship with Jesus and with Jesus' people: this relationship is the definition of church. — Pastor Jira



A Closer Look at the Bible - Pastor Jira Albers

Acts 11:1-18

1 Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. 2 So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, 3 saying, Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?"4 Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, 5 I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. 6 As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. 7 I also heard a voice saying to me, Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' 8 But I replied, By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' 9 But a second time the voice answered from heaven, What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' 10 This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. 11 At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. 12 The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. 13 He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; 14 he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved.' 15 And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. 16 And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' 17 If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?'18 When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life."

Around 400 years before Jesus' time, the people of Israel were just starting to reestablish themselves as a nation after being destroyed and divided by the Babylonians. The Temple was rebuilt during this time period (the time period of King Darius), and the people of God also needed to be "rebuilt" after years and years of exile. The prophet Ezra reintroduced the Torah (the first five books of the Bible) and was strict with the people concerning Gentile exclusion. Men were not to keep the Gentile wives they took in Babylon. Doing so could bring moral and ritual impurity into the life of Israel. Ezra imagined Israel as divinely ordained to remain pure and holy, set apart and without the influence of other nations in Canaan. Therefore, all of this reestablished an emphasis on the purity laws of the Torah. There were animals that the people of Israel were not to eat and there were actions that they similarly were not to do. We know well concerning the prohibition regarding pork, but other things were prohibited such as reptiles, dolphins, and eagles. By following these holy rules, the people of God are set apart from the rest of the world in obvious ways that all can see.

Given this, one of the biggest questions in early Christianity was whether or not Gentiles (non-Jews) could be allowed into the church and whether or not they needed to follow Jewish laws if they were allowed into the church. Remember, early Christians were all Jewish.

In light of the recent history of Israel at the time and its emphasis on excluding the Gentiles, it seems suspect that the Holy Spirit would come to a Gentile named Cornelius. It was even more suspect that the Holy Spirit would lead the people of God toward eating with those who are impure. Note: in the first few lines of this scripture selection, the acceptance of God's word by some Gentiles is not the greatest concern, rather, the fact that Peter ate with them within their home was the greatest concern. Surely, it was an experience of impurity. This is where a new revelation from God comes into play.

Peter receives a vision from God which has a great vessel, like a sheet, that was lowered down onto the earth and it contained all the animals and birds of the earth, including reptiles. A voice from heaven then says "Rise up Peter; kill and eat." When Peter protests eating unclean animals the voice further instructs: "What God has made clean, you must not call profane." This is a new revelation. Previously, God had instructed only to eat certain things. Now God instructed that all of these things are acceptable as food. This is not the first time God has changed God's mind. God changes God's mind when Moses convinces God to show mercy to God's rebellious people. God changes God's mind toward mercy on multiple occasions. Immediately, those that Cornelius sent show up on the scene and Peter gets the message: the Gentiles are to be included in God's people. But, such a new revelation like this is not given only to Peter. It is confirmed by the Spirit's presence with Cornelius. It is also backed up by Hebrew Scripture that disagrees with the exclusionary ideas of Ezra's time (Isaiah 49:6 and the Book of Ruth to name just a couple of the numerous examples).


Note: This major change in belief is eventually accepted by the early Jewish Christians, but it is not immediate. The "Gentile Question" is not settled until Chapter 15 in Acts. Change has always been hard.

Saturday Evening at Zion, Tamaqua



One size does not fit all, especially when it comes to worship styles. Five years ago Zion, Tamaqua developed a Saturday evening service to provide an alternative time of worship for people who cannot get to a Sunday service, and • provide an alternative style of worship for people who do not relate to the typical traditional high liturgy.

The service includes all the parts of a traditional service but in a more relaxed, informal style. Within a short period of time, we installed a digital projector and purchased the ProPresenter program to organize our worship and to allow us to add purchased music and subject matter videos to our service.


Because of it's flexibility, the Saturday service has been adapted to include a special service for cancer survivors, our annual blessing of the animals, a vow renewal service around Valentine's Day, and a Christmas in July service complete with a full holiday dinner following the service. All the Saturday services begin with Godsightings, when people are encouraged to share where they have seen God at work in their lives during the past week.

In December 2017 we began live-streaming our Saturday and Sunday services through Boxcast. As of March 30, we have webcast 107 services. On our website we've reached 379 unique viewers who watched 1,491 times. We began posting on Facebook in March 2018. Since then we've had 2,522 viewers of Saturday services and 2,830 viewers of Sunday services. Services are archived for several weeks.

Community Breakfast at St. John, Easton



A member of St. John's Lutheran Church in historic downtown Easton came to the Outreach Committee meeting and said, "Let's have a community breakfast." No agenda, no cost, just something to get people together. The committee mulled it over and said, "Let's do it!"

Breakfast had already become a speciality for Roger Ruggles. On Sunday mornings he cooked pancakes, French toast, and bacon/sausage; and he served them with fruit for any in the Sunday school before the 9:00 start time.



Roger decided to extend what he already knew; so he recruited some others to help cook: Mayor Sal Panto, and Roger's brother-in-law Dennis Greenleaf. And Roger also invited Bishop Zeizer, who was kind enough to attend and help fix the plates.

At the free meal firefighters, police officers, community leaders, Lafayette students, neighbors, some homeless, and parishioners gathered together to eat. Another church even sent volunteers to help serve. The volunteers served over a hundred people, and comments from the diners were very positive.

A simple breakfast became an example of hospitality in downtown Easton at its best!
